



Division 5 BOD Meeting Notes

December 15th, 2008

Present: Al Cap, Dale Smith, Bonnie Lette, Wayne Lette, Don Bittner, Bruce Lutheran, Mike Buehner, Matt Kross, Lenny Kessler, Bill Eville, and Bill Brodie.

Due to bad weather, the scheduled BOD in November was called off.

The board reviewed the upcoming meeting programs and Bring & Brag themes. We need to solicit the membership for program ideas and Bring & Brag themes.

It was decided to keep the January 2009 meeting on the first Friday of the month (Jan 2) for consistency.

The BOD approved the proposed rules and prizes for the 2011 convention naming contest. The rules and entry form will be put in the Trainwire and on the website.

Bill Eville reported that the HO module setup and operations at Lake Farmpark went reasonably well. Bill will try to have HO module running time signup sheets at the March meeting for the Railfest setup. The BOD asked the HO module coordinator to try to write up something every month for the Trainwire about what is going on with the HO modules.

There was some discussion about alternative dates and times when we could hold the annual Division 5 Christmas Party. It has always been at the same time as the Lake Farmpark HO module operations which prevents some members from being able to attend. Further discussion on this topic was tabled until a future BOD meeting.

There was also discussion about adding a second Chinese Gift Exchange to the Christmas Party that the spouses could participate in. This exchange would be a general, non-railroad related category that everyone could participate in. More discussion on this will be done at future BOD meetings.

There was extended discussion about how to promote the NMRA Achievement Program within Division 5. A number of suggestions were made. Bill Brodie will try to do more at the meetings. We would like to get those Division 5 members who have earned one of the AP certificates to spend a few minutes at a meeting talking about what they did to earn the certificate.

Both the Railfest 2008 and Division 5 financial audits are past due. Matt Kross indicated that his schedule has been such that he has not been able to get the audits scheduled and therefore the Superintendent should see if he can find someone else to conduct the audits along with Mike Schaab. Lenny Kessler indicated that he might be willing to take over as an auditor. Al Cap will contact Rob Bowers to check on the status of the Railfest books.

Dale Smith and Bruce Lutheran gave an update on Promo Day 2009 planning. They are looking for one more person to assist them with the project. Bob Frieden has been contacted and is willing to work with us as a joint event. We are looking at having some common advertising and fliers. Bruce is trying to get fliers made in time for Railfest.

Dale Smith proposed that we try to hold a true, old-fashioned, model railroad "swap" meet where just individuals (no dealers) bring items that they would like to sell or trade. Half a table would be provided to each person that signs up to sell items. There would be no charge for the tables and no fee for people to get in. Costs will be kept to a minimum. Advertising would be through the Trainwire, website, notices to other divisions, and a few fliers in local hobby shops. We would start out small and see how it goes. It is suggested that we plan for the event in September at the Hambden Town Hall.

No additional 2009 budget requests have been received. Bonnie Lette will update the 2008 income figures with the amounts from the year end statements and the Christmas Party ticket sales. The finalized budget will then be sent out to the BOD members.

Modeling Conifers

This week I started on one of the projects that I've been putting off for many months, not because it's a difficult project but rather it's somewhat of a boring, tedious project with no immediate reward. The project I'm talking about is making trees, or more specifically, pine trees or conifers. While I've made pine trees before using several techniques, I thought that I'd try something different, which would hopefully be easier and cheaper, yet still result in good quality trees. While various methods such as what I'm about to describe have been written about before, I thought

it was worth going over in detail for anyone who is new to making trees and needs to add a pine forest to their layout. First let's start with a list of materials that will be used. The list includes: package of dowel rods (3/16" dia.) purchased at the local craft store, adhesive spray or bottle of white glue, portable hand drill, coarse sand paper (#40, 50 or 60), fine threaded bolt or screw, rasp, wood stain (color is your preference), fibrous furnace filter, black, light gray, and several shades of green spray paint, foam block, and several colors of fine ground foam. Oh and add in a wastebasket, which you'll see in a

moment is very handy to keep the work area clean. Ok we're ready to start the process. The first thing we'll need is the package of dowel rods or sticks cut to the size of the tree we want to make. For my purposes, I take the bag of sticks to the chop saw and take out a small handful and cut them into two lengths, usually a 5-inch and 7-inch length or 4-inch and 8-inch length. Once that's done, it's time to move to preparing the dowel pieces and start their transition to trees. For this, I use a piece of coarse sandpaper and my portable hand drill. After inserting the stick into the chuck and tightening, I spin them

using the high speed on the drill and run the sandpaper over the dowel, starting at the tip and bringing it back towards me as I taper the stick to the shape that I want. For my purposes, I usually remove enough wood at the tip so that it is roughly half the starting diameter of the dowel. Remember to use the wastebasket, as this process generates a lot of fine wood dust, which in itself can be used on the layout as needed. It's also helpful to have a second piece of paper or cardboard over the sandpaper, as just a single piece of sandpaper can get

hot very quickly. Once the shaping to the proper taper is done, which usually requires about 20-30 seconds on the drill; I take the bolt or rasp and rotate the wood as the tool is held against the surface. The idea behind this process is to rough up the wood so that you produce a surface similar to the bark of a tree.



After the tapering is finished, it's time to stain the trees. I prefer to use the Woodland Scenics rock washes to color my tree trunks, however, you could use a paint wash or stain

if you prefer. Remember that most tree trunks are not really brown, that's why I prefer to use a wash or stain that is a mixture of grays.



While the stain is drying, it's time to start cutting up the filter material into several sizes. You're going to need a variety of sizes, especially if you plan to have some tall trees. I start by cutting up a number of square pieces of the filter material, usually starting with a 1-1/2 inch square and making successively smaller squares to a final size of 1/4-inch. For tall

conifers, I usually start with a base layer of branches that's 1-1/2-inches wide and then alternate the size of the filter squares for several layers. As you work your way up the tree, you'll begin to use alternating layers of smaller filter squares. Typically the furnace filter material is approximately 1/2-inch in width, and can be peeled into two or three thin layers. I usually place the layers no more than 1/8-inch to 1/4-inch apart. It's now time

to make some trees. Simply place the largest piece of filter onto the stick, and slide it down to the lowest level and apply some glue. This process is repeated with successively smaller pieces of filter material. Generally, I will only place two pieces of the same size of filter back to back, and then insert a smaller piece of filter. The sizes can be varied depending on how

tall a tree you're making, such as a 1-inch piece followed by a couple of 3/4-inch pieces, another 1-inch piece, a 3/4-inch piece, a couple of 1/2-inch pieces, etc. The general idea is to give the tree some fullness, with a gradual taper toward the tip. Take your scissors out and cut the tree to shape the desired if needed.

The last steps for the trees is to cover spray the underside of the tree with a dark green or black paint, and then turn them over and cover from the top down with some fine ground foam. Holding the base of the tree in one hand, you'll want to spray some adhesive on the tree from the top down. Then sprinkle the ground foam so that it only adheres to the top

surface of the branches. You can vary the colors of the ground foam. I try to vary my trees with a medium green and dark green foams. Set the tree aside to dry for the night and repeat the process again and again.

There you have it, a quick and easy way to make some pine trees. Usually I'll make about 100 or so trees over a 2-3 eve-

ning period. Once you have the trunks to shape and stained, it only takes a few minutes per tree to place the furnace filters on and add the ground foam. They may not be as deluxe a tree as what you can buy, but I think they make a great tree for your background.


