

50's-60's Railfanning in HO scale

I was out chasing trains in the Ohpawva Wheeling area and came across these two B&O EMD switchers working in the yard. They have a daily routine of removing empty scrap gondolas and replacing them with loaded scrap gondolas at United States Steels large Ohio works open hearth plant. USS has 12 furnaces here and consume copious amounts of scrap. The B&O switches one of the three tracks that service USSs scrap house the other two are the mills interplant railroad. This satisfies a contract that dates back to right after the Civil war when this was Kemper iron works before it was taken over by USS in the early part of the 20th century. Apparently the B&O will switch this one track till Satan's Den is covered in ice.

Their day starts by rounding up the loaded gondolas in the yard and staging them in an out-

bound track. Then they will head to the mill to pick up the empties. When arriving they will open the gate and proceed in to couple to the cars. While this is happening the crane operator is unloading the gondolas in the other two tracks with a large electromagnet. It's important to keep the food coming to the hungry furnaces. Now they are ready to head back to the yard to drop the empties and retrieve the loads.

Once back at Ohpawva yard they will drop the empties on an outbound track and couple to the loaded gons. Once air pressure has built up its time to head back to the mill. Back at the mill they will spot the loaded gons in the scrap house, set the retainers, close the gate and return to the yard. Now it's time for lunch before they finish out the day banging cars around the yard.



Ringling Museum

As we do every summer, we make the trip to our home in Fort Myers to prepare it for hurricane season, and, as always, we try to find a relatively close railroad attraction. This year, we decided to take the 75-mile trip north to explore the John and Mable Ringling Museum in Sarasota. I'll skip the boring non-train-related items, such as the live circus performance, art museum, historical home, gardens, and circus memorabilia, and go directly to the two main attractions that caught my attention: the fictitious Howard Brothers Circus display and the restored Ringling Railroad Car, named The Wisconsin.

I'll start with the Howard Brothers Circus. This is a complete \(\frac{3}{2} \) scale replica of the famous Ringling Brothers Circus. You may wonder why he didn't call it the Ringling Brothers Circus, and there is a unique story behind that. Howard Tibbals, the creator, approached Ringling management in the past when he was building this display, and Ringling refused to let him use the name. So, Howard named it after himself and added Brothers to mimic Ringling Brothers. The ironic thing is, years later, when looking for a permanent home for this massive, impressive display, it ended up at the Ringling Museum. It took roughly an hour to tour this display, and the attention to detail is mind-boggling. I had to remember he carved and created almost every piece of the over 1,000,000-piece display single-handedly over 60+ years. No detail is missed, and you have to stop and look closely to see all the action around. If you search for Howard Brothers Circus on YouTube, there have been many videos made of this display. I recommend viewing those if you can't ever make it in person to the display.

In another area of the museum sits the beautifully restored railcar named The Wisconsin. This was the personal railroad car of John Ringling and was manufactured by Pullman in 1896 at an original cost of \$11,325 and refurbished in 1905 with Ringling's specifications. Unfortunately, The Wisconsin was sold in 1916 due to New York City's ban on wooden railcars in tunnels. Years later, it was discovered in rather poor shape in North Carolina, being used as a fishing cabin. In the early 2000's, it took three years to complete exterior renovations, and then it was moved to its current home in Sarasota to complete interior work. You are not allowed inside the car, but they do have a ramp running the length of the car on one side so you can walk up and peek inside and see the masterful restoration job up close. When seeing it up close, you can just picture how much work went into this car to give the Ringling's every comfort of home on the road. These two attractions, along with all the others, made the \$30 ticket seem like a bargain.
















The disconsin RAILROAD CAR The great success of the Ringling circus in the early years of the 20th century was paralleled by important events in the business and personal life of John Ringling. The brothers successfully negotiated a routing agreement with their greatest rival, James Bailey, and John began branching out his investments into railroads, oil, and real estate. On the personal front, John Ringling married Mable Burton in Hoboken, New Jersey on December 29, 1905. The Wisconsin, the private railroad car that John purchased from the Pullman Company in 1905, was the ultimate symbol of his success. From 1905 until 1916 this car transported the Ringlings across the country for business and pleasure. As the advance man, John traveled ahead of the circus train, planning the route and making deals for provisions. Occasionally he would cross the path of the circus train and The Wisconsin would join the John and Mable Ringling also traveled for pleasure on The Wisconsin. The car carried them to Baraboo for family gatherings and allowed them to host friends and family on cross country journeys. It was this railroad car that brought the Ringlings to Florida in 1911 to finalize the purchase of the bayfront property in Sarasota. News articles of the day described the quiet elegance of the car and made News articles of the day described the quiet elegance of the car and made mention of the modern conveniences including electric lights and fans throughout as well as a well-stocked refrigerator. Today, the grandeur of the restored Wisconsin Railroad Car is a reminder of the great success of John Ringling as well as of the luxury enjoyed by the titans of the Gilded Age.

When The Ringling Museum acquired the Wisconsin in 2003, it was in poor condition, having spent several decades in Morehead City, North Carolina, serving as a fishing cabin for vacationing railroad officials. The wooden exterior was rotting and the beautifully inlaid wood panels that line the interior had been covered in eight layers of paint. Despite these problems, the basic structure of the car was still in good condition and almost all of the original stained glass was still intact.

Restoration of the exterior of the car took almost three years. The work, done at Edwards Railcar Company of Montgomery, Alabama, included the massive task of removing the paint from the interior, repairing the roof, cleaning the undercarriage, replacing the rotted exterior wood, and painting the *Wisconsin* the original Pullman Green that is a hallmark of the company's historic passenger cars.

In 2008 the Wisconsin was moved to The Ringling for completion of the interior restoration. Museum conservation staff, guided by private car historian David Duncan, completed the restoration of the original inlaid wood paneling and restored and reinstalled all of the car hardware and the stained glass windows. Careful exploration of the ceilings revealed the historic colors and decorations. The original appearance has been restored along with the decorative gilding both inside the car and on its exterior.

The carpet is a replica of a standard Pullman carpeting of the time, and the tiled floor is a recreation of the original green and red rubber tiling that had deteriorated. The upholstered sofas and berths, along with the light fixtures, are original to the Wisconsin, while other components, like the bathtub, which is identical to the one removed in an earlier renovation, are from the same period. The kitchen was faithfully recreated from the original plans.
